Circulation

CMS Library circulated 4,571 items in the 1st 9 weeks. (1,293 non-fiction, 3,019 fiction, 249 audiobooks and 10 DVD's)

Computer and Surface usage

We have 28 new computers in the library for student use, plus 6 computers reserved for AR tests. Of the 41 school days in the 1st 9 weeks, the library lab was used 27 days and the surfaces were used 24 days. Computer labs were used for STAR reading tests, research, study island, MAP testing, ILP's, AR tests and other educational websites.

Activities in the Library

The 1st Scholastic Book Fair was held in September, which allowed us to purchase 69 new books for our students. The library has also been used for Y-Club meetings, first aid training, Eagle family night and Eagle Rally activities.

In order to do this we spent the first few weeks of August weeding out books that have not circulated in years or were outdated or discolored. There were a total of 450 books discarded. These books are still on a cart in the library storage for teachers to browse and take anything they may find useful. The remainder will be given to students. We have already noticed an increase in students browsing the non-fiction shelves.
